Next I would like to introduce a Japanese doctor who works on a casual basis at Peel Health Campus. (due to qualification system).

His name is Yamauchi Hajime and he is going to Japan. (by the time this newsletter is published he will be there)

Dr Yamauchi felt straight away that he had to go to Japan to help the tsunami victims (there is a shortage of everything including medical assistance). He told his wife of his intention and her answer was "I was waiting for you to say when you are going " and

"Yes you should go". Wonderful lady but there is some problem. Because he is only employed as a casual doctor at Mandurah if he doesn't work, of course he doesn't get paid.. Dr and Mrs Yamauchi quickly worked out that their saving will last only 6 weeks then he will have to come back. Most Doctors in the Tsunami hit area work as volunteers and are not getting paid. I would like to send him some money to support him and his family (they have 3 young children). This way I feel I'm doing something toward those people who need help.

If I can send some money to him, he can stay longer and help the people who need medical help.
